## 19. WE CONFESS OUR FAITH IN GOD

After a Litany of Supplication in which we pray that God will accept the gifts that we have brought to God's Throne, we pledge our faith in God. The priest gives us the blessing of peace and says:

"Let us love one another that with one mind we may confess."

Two things are important as we confess our faith. First, the priest asks us to **love** each other. We cannot truly love God and offer gifts to Him if we hate our brother. As Jesus Himself tells us:

"So if you are offering your gift at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift."

(Matthew 5:23-24)

Secondly, we must really believe in God in the same way, as if we were of **one mind.** St. Paul describes the Church as being together as one people of God. He says:

"There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all."

(Ephesians 4:4-6)

Now we answer the priest saying that we confess God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in the Holy Trinity. Then we proclaim our Faith by reciting the Creed — the Symbol of Faith, just as we did (or our godparents did for us) on the day when we were baptized.

## Review
